- Provides a means for military families to relocate with no interruption to their profession.








MAP OF OT COMPACT MEMBER STATES

ABOUT COMPACTS

The past several years has seen astounding interest in occupational interstate compacts. Interstate compacts are contracts between states, which establish formal agreements between states that have been enacted via the legislative process. Compacts have been recognized for years to be durable policy solutions. The most well-known compact is the Driver's License Compact but there are various others that have been used to assist in many other professional, practical, occupational, and operational areas. Each state has enacted at least one compact, and most have enacted an average of twenty-five compacts.

Additionally, there has been continued growth in the number of interstate occupational compacts being offered by professions. The OTCC appreciates CSG's National Center for Interstate Compacts for the following information.

As of October 2023, there are multiple professional licensure interstate compacts in development, including:

- Dietetics
- School Psychology

Several other professions have prepared occupational interstate compact legislation that is ready to be introduced at the state-level, but have not reached the threshold for operation:

- Advanced Practice Registered Nursing
- Cosmetology
- Dentistry and Dental Hygiene
- Massage Therapy
- Physicians Assistants
- Teaching



FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The OT Compact is an agreement between member states designed to facilitate the interstate practice of occupational therapy across state boundaries without having to become licensed in additional member states. Occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants licensed in their Home State, which is a member of the OT Compact, are able to practice in other member states via a privilege to practice issued through the Commission. The purpose of the OT Compact is to increase public access to needed occupational therapy services by increasing access to care and providing mechanisms for continuity of care all while ensuring a higher degree of consumer protection across state lines. The OT Compact also promotes cooperation between member states in the areas of licensure and regulation. To join the OT Compact, a state must enact the model legislation into law. The OT Compact is governed by the Commission, a governmental entity made up of the member states. The Commission meets annually. The Commission has approved a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) and the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT), which covers the initial funding for services needed by the Commission. The Commission also has a MOU with the Association & Society Management International (ASMI) to act as the Secretariat for the Commission.

STATUS OF THE OT COMPACT

The OT Compact welcomed its tenth (10th) state with enacted legislation in June 2022; this allowed the Commission to become an active governmental body. As of July 2023, twenty-eight (28) states have enacted the legislation. The Commission is active, and Bylaws and Rules are approved. The Commission is not yet issuing privileges to practice, pending the development and implementation of a data system. Progress has been limited by the thoughtful development of the Commission's operational framework, including selection of a Secretariat, hiring an Executive Director, providing a point of contact for delegates and alternates, development of Bylaws and Rules, establishing an annual budget, etc., while using volunteer committees to carry out these requirements. Additionally, there are limited options for a commercially available database system that will allow member states to communicate applicant data and operational issues easily and efficiently to the Commission, and conversely allow the Commission to easily and efficiently transmit critical information and operational issues to the member states.

Revenue/Expenditures

The Commission has an MOU with AOTA and NBCOT to cover the initial funds necessary to operationalize the Commission. These funds are designated to cover secretariat costs, staffing, legal counsel, and professional fees such as website maintenance, Directors & Officers Insurance, and travel costs for OTCC staff and leadership.

The Commission is currently not receiving revenue through the Compact. The Commission has not yet determined if there will be an annual state assessment fee or the cost of the privilege to practice.

Other Information

As part of the MOU between the OTCC and AOTA and NBCOT, the organizations will continue to assume the operating expenses until the Compact becomes sustainable through issuing privileges to practice. The Commission will be responsible for maintaining the database and software systems to implement the Compact.

Data System

The data system development will begin in 2024. This is a joint effort among the Executive Committees and representatives from the Occupational Therapy Compact Commission, the Counseling Compact Commission, and the Audiology/Speech Language Pathology (ASLP) Compact Commission. The expenses for the data system are being shared between the three Commissions. This is a groundbreaking and unique undertaking which will provide the necessary data system that meets the needs of these three professions will laying a foundation for future professions who enter compacts and need similar data software solutions to operationalize their licensure privileges.
